



The Study

The City of Belmont commissioned CATALYSE® to conduct an independent MARKYT® Community Scorecard.

Scorecard invitations were sent to 8,000 randomly selected households; 2,000 by mail and 6,000 by email. The City provided supporting promotions through its communication channels.








The scorecard was open from 5 September to 3 October 2022 and was completed by **901 community members** with various connections to the City:

Local resident	Out of area ratepayer / visitor	Elected Member / Employee
844	49	11

Overall, 574 residents had been randomly selected and 270 opted in from the general population. As responses were comparable between the random and opt in sample, the main body of this report shows responses from all resident respondents. Results from other community groups are reported separately at the end of this report.

Where sub-totals add to $\pm 1\%$ of the parts, this is due to rounding errors to zero decimal places.









Community safety and crime prevention

Community Driven Actions

- Advocate for a greater police presence across the City of Belmont with more patrols, especially at night.
- Strengthen Community Watch / Eyes on the Street with more security patrols (especially at night), and greater powers and authority.
- Install more CCTV cameras in well known hot spots such as Belmont Forum, train stations and car parks.
- Provide incentives for home and business owners to install CCTV and security measures.
- Improve lighting in streets and public areas.
- Advocate for more housing and support for the homeless including addiction and mental health services.

Community Voices

"More police in the area on foot/bike/ horse. More "Eyes on the Street."

"More police and other security people especially after dark and with quick response times."

"More police on the streets at all hours of the day, criminals don't sleep especially when on drugs. Community Watch patrols need to be increased to cope with demand and have a stronger presence."

"We are still having too many issues with crime within the City of Belmont. I think the security patrols are good maybe then need to be stepped up a little. From what I can see the patrols just drive around and very rarely get out of the car."

"More security patrols around the streets, especially around parks, public housing and Belmont Forum."

"More Eyes on the Street with authority."

"Improved security lighting and improved street lighting. Video / camera surveillance of street and parking areas to deter criminal behaviour."

"More lighting and security cameras in known crime hotspots and dark areas."

"It would be great to install video surveillance on the bus stops next to Belmont Forum and 8 Yolks Café. Install video surveillance and increase police presence next to Belmont Forum. I constantly get harassed by people in that area. Would be great if I could feel safe going to the shops and taking a bus."

"More CCTV. Encourage Body Corporates to install security gates and CCTV."

"Continue supporting residents to get cameras or other security items (eg bike ID)"

"Addressing issues such as homelessness and advocacy for homeless.

Assistance with finding accommodation."

"Look after homeless people in the city. Facilitate support for people with addiction and mental health problems."



Lighting of streets and public places

Community Driven Actions

- Advocate for more lighting in residential areas, especially in public places such as parks, ovals and bus stops.
- Install more lighting to deter anti social behaviour and criminal activity.
- Ensure existing lighting is well maintained (globes replaced, broken lights fixed, etc.)
- Upgrade to LED lighting, use brighter light bulbs, use more solar lighting.

Community Voices

"Brighter street lighting, especially at bus stops, would be beneficial, especially for the elderly.

Would also stop anti-social behaviour."

"Improve lighting coverage of dark/hidden/unlit/poorly lit areas along street parking and street verges."

"Review of all minor street lighting. It's terrible when the weather is bad, or it is dark."

"Some parks, including Centenary park, do not have lights around the oval and through the back area. Many people walk here at night with little visibility."

"Street lighting is terrible throughout the suburbs within the City of Belmont. We have beautiful parks but are let down by safe access to these areas after hours of light due to poor street lighting. This leads to less passive security of neighbourhoods as people are not active walking around during twilight."

"It is so dark at night. I have to put car in full beam to drive home along some streets. I'd never walk around here at night, and it's not even that late. 6 pm in winter!"

"Most of the streets have less lights. This is an invitation for the thieves. Especially in the winter, walking to bus stops is hard as less lights on streets. If you have good lighting, that will light up houses, too making it difficult for thieves to access the properties."

"Upgrading bulbs so they radiate more light."

"Lighting on pathways for resident safety at night. My suggestion is solar battery-operated sensor path lights. They may also deter criminal activity."

"Use of brighter, low-consumption LED or similar streetlights throughout.

Would reduce crime too."

"Exchanging old streetlights with energy-efficient LED lighting along with increasing coverage."

"Some streets do not have lights or dim lights. Invest in solar-powered verge lights."



Sustainable practices / climate change

Community Driven Actions

- 1. Improve recycling facilities.
- Introduce a 3-bin system for the separation of green and organic waste.
- 3. Be more **environmentally aware** improve urban canopy, leave more vegetation, plant more trees, encourage verge gardens, support native animals, improve tree density etc.
- Advocate for greater production and consumption of renewable energy with solar battery grants, solar panels, windmills, rainwater tanks.
- 5. Encourage greater adoption of sustainable practices with **education**, **financial incentives**, **rebates** etc.
- Facilitate greater adoption and use of electric vehicles with more EV charging points.

Community Voices

"Change the bin systems - stop talking about it and actually do it. Increase the recycling bin emptying to weekly, make the green bins smaller and change the green bins to fortnightly."

"More complex bin system - greens. Information provided about recycling and local places to recycle items."

"I see improvement in some streetscapes - but more greening/tree planting to provide shade throughout the city to help with temperature rising because of the concrete/asphalt jungle we have naively allowed to be created."

"Encouraging more sustainable practices, offering workshops and incentives to help this.

Make it sound interesting, fun, and interactive to involve the whole family."

"Plant more trees, plant more trees, PLANT MORE TREES. And stop the destruction of the Swan river foreshore (especially at the Springs). Whenever there is a new high rise along the river, trees along the foreshore magically disappear or get "thinned."

"Wastage is a huge problem. I don't feel recycling is greatly encouraged (there are not even recycling bins in the shopping centre!) We need to think about more innovative ways to reuse and reduce our impact."

"Encouraging the use of sustainable solutions, letting verges grow wild or be used for home gardens. Creating connection and education so that the children love and respect the environment, which is clearly lacking in the school by the litter present."

"Green waste/food scrap bins for composting and occasional open mulch and compost days for homeowners will help water usage. Continue the good work on treescapes, but the verges, which are 3m in the older areas, are an untapped resource for carbon sequestration (acknowledging it's a long payoff). What about some EV chargers at the forum, library or parks/community."

"Council buildings and vehicles to be powered by renewable energy as soon as is practicable.

Wherever possible, convert street lighting and any outdoor lighting to solar power."

"Better rebates or assistance for efficiency with energy, water, growing your own food, compost."



Community Action Plan Streetscapes, trees and verges

Community Driven Actions

- Beautify streetscapes and establish a shade canopy –
 plant more trees, shrubs and plants. When choosing
 trees consider mature trees, shade coverage,
 evergreens, colour, natives etc.
- Improve verge maintenance regular tree pruning, weed and rubbish removal, grass cutting, etc.
- Provide tighter controls in new developments for the removal of trees and the provision of green open space.
- Advocate for underground power.

Community Voices

"Continue tree planting and greening all areas possible."

"Greener, shadier trees to be planted on verges, not the ugly stick trees that will not provide adequate shade once grown."

"The street trees in Orpington Street are scruffy, it would be preferable they had a pretty and colourful flowers and an evergreen foliage. Our tree is grey looking the foliage is uninteresting.

It always looks dusty and downcast."

"Only plant native plants - note Jacaranda trees are NOT native."

"The verges need to be moved to keep the weeds and wild oats in control. Most streets would be much improved if they were free of overgrown weeds. If that is the responsibility of owners then a system should be enforced to set up to make it happen."

"More tree lopping and cleaning up verges that are left to become overgrown."

"Verges to be maintained rubbish to be removed, strong encouragement for owners from council to get old cars and junk removal."

"The current management seems to be hit and miss. Whilst some streets and verges seem to get an abundance of attention and regular maintenance, others are ignored and become ugly messy areas of overgrown grasses and weeds in winter and then dustbowls in summer.

"We need to stop clearing blocks of all vegetation and keep large trees.

Our tree canopy is very poor."

"Requirement to preserve old trees during new development. A minimum requirement of one tree per X square meterage on residential, commercial premises and City land."

"Sinking over-head powerlines and planting even more mature trees."

"Additionally, it is important for the streetscape to lobby the State Govt for funds to install below ground power as has recently been done in Carlisle. This also provides protection for mature street trees from being hacked back each year. This is also a saving to the environment and to ratepayers."



Community Action Plan Seniors' services and care

Community Driven Actions

- Provide a greater range of activities for seniors to socialise and connect. Suggestions include social gatherings, entertainment, walking/swimming groups, gardening, technology classes, social daces, table tennis, arts, cycling etc.
- Advocate for more affordable seniors housing, aged care facilities, and assisted, living-at-home services
- Improve communication of activities and services available for seniors.
- Provide more community transport services for seniors.
- Improve parking for seniors at Belmont Shopping Centre to make shops and commercial services more accessible.

Community Voices

"Better access to services. More activities such as social gatherings many are alone and feel isolated."

"I am unsure, but perhaps there should be more basic computer & technology classes for old folks."

"To do more for seniors and give them more facilities and more outdoor activities."

"Increased access to senior day programs in arts and hobbies to provide greater community connection. Introduction of pickle ball and walking basketball at the rec centre. Walking and cycling groups for seniors. Easier access to information on what is available for seniors...

it's difficult to find information."

"More affordable housing for seniors to remain living in the area."

"Help cater for the ageing population who wish to stay at home as long as possible rather than move into aged care."

"Affordable accommodation for seniors."

"More information about how and what's available. How do you find the information."

"I would like to see this area improved with better communication of what's available for seniors and the help given."

"More transport options, e.g. minibus or taxi pickups for those still living in their own home."

"Suggest discounted or free garden and home maintenance by council staff for the elderly.

Free shuttle service to Belmont Forum precinct."

"Make it easier for the elderly to park in shopping centre car parks. There are few opportunities to wheel a trolley over the kerbs, and returning trolleys to bays is full of hassles."

"Parking at Belmont shopping centre. Consideration for them while shopping."



Festivals, events, art and cultural activities

Community Driven Actions

- Hold more events to encourage community connection and to bring visitors to the City. Suggestions include:
 - Food festivals
 - Outdoor pop-up markets
 - Farmers' markets
 - Live music
- Ensure activities and events cater to a variety of demographic groups including families, adults without children, seniors and different ethic groups.
- Support local artists by providing more workshops at Belmont Hub and dedicated spaces for artists to work and exhibit.

Community Voices

"More activities to activate and connect the community."

"Farmers' market would be great, the swap meet looks tacky and doesn't draw tourists."

"Closing off roads and having food vans, entertainment and a gathering of local people a few times a year would be great."

"I'd love to see more pop-up markets, live music, family friendly events, etc. Key thing here is to keep prices affordable for businesses and patrons."

"You have services and events for youth, you have services and events for families with children, you have services and events for seniors. What about adults without kids?

As a non-drinker there aren't really any community events or services that would enable me to meet other people my own age in the community"

"Activities for seniors eg bowling carnival, picnic or movies in the park etc that will engage the older generation with similar aged people."

"Having more cultural festivals that include: Melanesian countries, Polynesian countries, Micronesian countries, African countries, Torres Strait Islander etc and not just focusing on one. Cultural activities that could include learning about these countries etc."

"More like the arts activities run at the Hub - for adults outside of business hours."

"A festival of Belmont showcasing the achievements of local people and the changing nature of our community. A place for local artists to display their works and ideas."

"Develop a Belmont Open Studios program for artists living in the City of Belmont.

Develop an artists' studios / arts centre for our City."

"As someone who hires spaces regularly, I feel the Council buildings are poorly managed and not well utilised. They are sub-par and in desperate need of upgrading when compared to the City of Vincent or Melville for example. Whilst the City hosts excellent festivals and youth services, arts opportunities are limited outside of these events."



Responsible growth and development

Community Driven Actions

- Advocate for less high-density development and ensure developers provide adequate infrastructure (in particular off-street parking)
- Provide greater infrastructure and amenities where high density developments have been approved (e.g. schools, road access)
- Consult all affected residents on new developments and listen to residents' concerns.
- Provide tighter controls in new developments for the removal of trees and the provision of green open space.

Community Voices

"Reduce the amount of apartment buildings within the City of Belmont. If apartments have to be approved ensure that there is adequate onsite parking."

"Stop building apartment blocks with insufficient off-street parking. Navigating down my street now is like playing dodgems between parked cars on the street and oncoming traffic.

An accident is just waiting to happen. Enough infil!!"

"Explosion of subdivisions with minimal growth of services and infrastructure to support population growth and congestion."

"Refrain from subdividing blocks smaller than 500sqm. Blocks of less than 400sqm inevitably means that the area becomes overcrowded and puts more stress on local facilities and infrastructure."

"The Springs house thousands of families but there are no shopping or other facilities in that area."

"Stop 3-storey or more developments two storey maximum in existing residential areas.

Protect existing residents' rights to reside in peace. Ask existing residents for their opinion on developments – and listen to their opinion!"

"Affected residents can feel rather powerless when facing a development application.

I recently felt that my concerns were dismissed in favour of the developer."

"Ensure all developments have plenty of trees on their property to prevent the concrete jungle that is evolving in this area. What used to be a beautiful leafy area is now an ugly concrete jungle"

"Considered planning with streetscapes either preserved or trees planted to soften the look of the buildings and provide a cooling environment."
